

Until then, happy railroading everyone!



Greetings on behalf of the Omaha Philatelic Society (OPS),

On September 5-7, 2008, OPS will host the 2008 Omaha Stamp Show at Metro Community College – (South Campus). The theme for the show is "Kanesville: The Beginning Of The Line For Omaha". (Kanesville became Council Bluffs in 1853).

With our Council Bluff's area rich history/interest in railroading and its ephemera (RPOs), it's about time that local philatelist give homage to our rail industry and model railroaders. For me, as a life member (L1612) of the NMRA, the enjoyment of our two hobbies can be highlighted during the stamp show.

One idea that I would like to activate for the show is to have an hourly door price around a railroading motif. So far I have obtained route schedules, calendars, ash trays, maps, plates, and recordings.

I am contacting NMRA members to ask that you share with peers that we are looking for philatelic exhibits, postcards, or other ephemera that highlight railroading or the history of Council Bluffs, Iowa/Nebraska. I am also open to suggestions to any workshops that a NMRA would like to share. The Omaha Stamp Show is free to the public. It is supported by the approx 20 dealers that will be offering their philatelic items for sale. In 2007 there were over 2,500 pages of philatelic exhibits from individuals throughout the United States.

Thanks! Clark Cooper Director, Eastern Iowa Division, MCoR, Several members have asked for interpretation of the requirements for Volunteer and Author in specific circumstances. We are providing those interpretations to all members in the event that others may have the same question. As always, feel free to ask your questions about the AP program. I think you will find the requirements more easily met than you might have first thought.

- 1. Volunteer (work day of event) Volunteer credits are earned based on the level and duration of service to the NMRA at all levels. For single events, "casual" volunteers (i.e., volunteers for only the day of the event for a specific task) earn credits as if they were members of the same committee for an entire month, the basic time unit for service. Unlike modular groups, they do not need to prepare in advance for the event. There is no need for an additional level of credit based on hours or other basis for volunteer work the day of an event. The current requirements are sufficient.
- 2. Author/Volunteer (credits for live clinics) A literal reading of the Author requirements shows that the first time a live clinic is given it earns Author credits and subsequent presentations earn Volunteer credits. Live clinics are recognized for credit for both Author and Volunteer, depending on circumstances.

Some members already have the Author certificate and are working on Volunteer. For perspective, in the Mid-Central Region, 203 members have earned the Volunteer certificate but not the Author (including 10 MMRs), 22 have earned Author but not Volunteer (including 3 MMRs), and 63 have earned both certificates (including 16 MMRs). The number of members who have already earned Author and not Volunteer is a reason to interpret the requirements a bit broader than the literal interpretation in this specific instance. These members are continuing to serve the organization in a very positive manner of sharing their expertise with others - one of the tenets of the AP program.

Clarification/Interpretation: If a member does not hold the Author certificate, then the requirements stand as is. Only if a member already holds the Author certificate, then both the first and subsequent presentations of a live clinic can be counted (with this explanation) as Volunteer credits.

3. Author (contribution to the convention clinic book) - The first credits for material related to a live clinic are for the clinic itself. If the submitted material is the handout that is required for Author credits as a live clinic, then no additional points are earned beyond those earned for the qualifying clinic. If an article is prepared specifically for the clinic books and goes beyond the handout and is not a transcription of the clinic itself, then the submission can be considered an article in a Regional publication (defined by circulation/distribution) even though the clinic book may not achieve the necessary level of sales to meet the Region definition as required for general publications.

This is analogous to the requirement that the direct taping of a live clinic does not satisfy the definition of the requirements for an instructional video tape and multi-media presentation; i.e., the direct transcription of a live clinic does not become an "article" for purposes of meeting the Author requirements.

The Editor of the Clinic book earns Volunteer credits at the rate of two per month as noted in the requirements for Volunteer.

In Memoriam: Michael Tager, Chairman of Model Power

Official statement released by Model Power

On October 27, 2007, a quiet pioneer of the hobby industry passed away. Michael Tager, chairman of Model Power, died at the age of eighty-five. While many in the industry knew of him; fewer still knew him well. He preferred to remain in the background of the company he founded more than thirty years ago. His two sons, Matthew, President of Model Power, and Josh, Vice President, were the face of the company to the industry. Most recently they were joined in the business by Matthew's sons, Jonathan, as Vice President of Sales, and Adam, as Vice President of Production.

Mike Tager wasn't always the quiet one. He began his career in the late fifties and the sixties as a dynamic young sales representative for Aurora, Matchbox, and Arrow Handicraft. When he took on sales responsibility for two start up electric train companies, Atlas Tool and Athearn, he grew their sales by a factor of ten. Mike, Steve Shaffen, and Irv Athearn were the three amigos, traveling the globe for fun and profit. The only drawback was that Shaffen and Tager were subject to the constant smell from Athearn's ever-present cigars. Worse yet, each were subject to the wry humor of the other two.

Among other things, Tager was an innovator. He pioneered the first ready to run HO electric train set combining Athearn locos, Atlas track and KF power packs. He was instrumental in eliminating the rubber band drive on Athearn's locos. He brought the first built up building models into the United States.

When he started Model Power in the seventies, Tager was able to put his extensive travel experience to work. He leveraged his contacts with Trix, Roco, Mehano, Sanda Kan, SKI Industrial, Faller, Tri-Ang, Thomas Salter and Hasegawa to provide Model Power with notable, quality products. While most well known for trains and accessories in HO, N, and some G gauge, Mike, along with his son Matt, diversified into the die-cast model airplane field, creating the popular Postage Stamp series, that now features 150 different scale planes.

Enthusiasts in the hobby industry are known for their passion. For Mike Tager, his passion stemmed from a love of immediate family that extended to touch each and every person in Model Power. Kind, patient, understanding, a great sounding board for an idea or a problem, he will be missed in a quiet and personal way by those who knew him. For those who knew of him, perhaps his story may serve as inspiration. He is survived by his wife, Judith, three sons, and eight grandchildren.




