

Twin Cities & Western up and running

Two shakedown sessions in January yield "fixable" issuesfrom kinky track (not operators) to paperwork improvements

Following a three month hiatus, operating sessions resumed with a new theme and scheme (sort of-if you discount my modeling the TCWR two years while living in South Dakota). In an economy move that reduces payroll and consumables by 25%, crews of three now work the rail-Management indiroad. cates it's too early to estimate actual cost savings.

Déjà vu—or shades of Malt O Meal revisited?



No, Dorothy, this isn't Minnesotawe're still located in Shawnee, Kansas. Bit if you read the RMC November issue and think that portions of the near and far end of this complex remind you of the Northfield, Minnesota based Malt-O-Meal plant and image found in that story, you'd be right.

Several structures from PGR and original track work remain intact during this phase of the return to the TCWR. The power plant and horizontal storage tanks are new, as are the tall silos made from pvc. The coal and limestone piles are also recent changes as are the addition of their (still undecorated) spurs and dump pits.

(above) GP 39-2, #2300, stayed busy blocking cars in the yard at Ruebel, home to the largest industry served by TCWR, the Southern Minnesota Beet Sugar Cooperative. Shortly before the arrival of the Ruebel turn, a unit train set out its consist on the coal spur and departed back to the Twin Cities.

The co-op generates outbound loads of bulk sugar, beet pellets (used for animal feed), and molasses. Coal and limestone are also essential raw materials in the sugar processing. Scenery and landscaping work to follow.

What's Upcoming?

The new year offers plenty of opportunity to return to operations. Newly acquired locomotives, decorated patch-out rolling stock, new track work on a significant portion of the layout along with the necessary paperwork are to a point that will permit a couple sessions each month, similar to the average during the first year of operations in Kansas.

Another positive factor in that prediction is a fairly firm schedule and part time ministry (albeit in Topeka) assignment. This normally will be from Sunday through Wednesday. These realities should allow me also to participate in operating sessions, for those layout owners kind enough to provide opportunities for me to enjoy their railroads.

I look forward to a great 2017 and the chance to enjoy the operations aspect of "the world's greatest hobby" with you in person or at least via Prairie Ponderings newsletters. If you are from outside Kansas and swing through this way, please let me know, and I'll try to offer a visit to the TCWR. We might even be able to schedule an operating session while you're visiting!

After leaving South Dakota several years ago, I again model operations on a the largest Minnesota shortline. It only took two years to figure out how to model a portion of the route that formerly occupied our "train room" (basement utility room).

Better track work, more realistic code 83 Atlas track, and several curved turnouts are among the enhancements thus far on nearly half of the layout. I appreciate the help of Doug Elder, Chuck Hitchcock, Keith Jordan, and Bob Willer. They contributed their talents ranging from track planning, laying track, wiring feeders, and drafting an orientation power point. The two new modules replace the PGR Lakeville sections. Those reside on campus at the University of Minnesota train club.

The first couple sessions held during January proved valuable for identifying areas the scheme can and will be improved. Noteworthy was the scarcity and infrequency of track problems, plus a few balky couplers that were replaced.

The new layout has potential to offer more enjoyment and challenge. Every job (unlike the PGR layout, where several

trains were merely transfers, every assignment on the TCWR includes switching opportunities, more variety, and challenge (at least I think so). 

















NMRA AP Group Rules and Regulations
