# July 9, 2021 WEEKLY Update Regarding COVID-19

Dear Residents, Families and Responsible Parties,

As a five-star retirement community, our top priority has always been the health and safety of our residents, families, visitors and staff. Lakeview is following guidance from multiple governmental agencies including the United States Centers for Disease Control (CDC), the United States Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS), the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE), the Kansas Department of Aging and Disability Services (KDADS) and the Johnson County Department of Health and Environment (JCDHE).

# Visitation Rules currently in effect are as follows:

- Assisted Living, ET Rehab, 1<sup>st</sup> Floor Care Center, & 2<sup>nd</sup> Floor Care Center residents can have indoor or outdoor visits. If your loved one is in a private room, you no longer need to schedule your visits with the social worker. Instead you may come and go whenever you would like while still following safety guidelines. If your loved one is in a <u>semi-private room</u> then you must continue to schedule your visits with the social worker to reserve the visiting space for a designated time. Compassionate care visits continue to take priority for the limited inside visits so we appreciate your flexibility with scheduling.
- If visiting Eastside Terrace, either Assisted Living or Rehab, you may use the main entrance of Eastside Terrace for screening and entering the building. The Eastside Terrace front entrance will be open to visitors Monday through Friday from 8:00am to 7:30pm and 8:00am to 4:30pm on Saturdays and Sundays. If visiting outside of these hours, please enter through the Heritage main entrance.
- All visitors must go through screening and we recommend a monthly negative COVID test if unvaccinated.
- All visitors and guests should go straight to their destinations and not wander around in the licensed areas, this is a federal regulatory requirement.
- While on the Lakeview Campus and during your visit social distancing of 6 feet, mask wearing, and good hand hygiene must be maintained at all times. If visitor and resident are fully vaccinated and the only ones in the room, masks may be removed while visiting.
- Outside visitation, if requested, will occur in the Memorial Garden Courtyard area for Care Center and by the fountain in front of Eastside Terrace for Assisted Living.
- If you are feeling sick or have any symptoms, please postpone your visit.

### Below is a list of safety precautions Lakeview has put in place:

- Anyone accessing the Lakeview campus must go through screening process which consists of a temperature check, health questionnaire and travel history. Lakeview follows the current KDHE quarantine guidelines for unvaccinated individuals: <u>https://www.coronavirus.kdheks.gov/175/Travel-Exposure-Related-Isolation-Quaran</u>
- In licensed areas, all staff, providers, and contractors must wear surgical mask. KN95s and N95s will only be utilized if a resident is quarantined for known exposure, symptomatic, or positive.

Even though a majority of the staff and residents have received their second COVID-19 vaccine it is critical that we continue to follow the 3 W's to help keep our community safe:

- Watch your distance by maintaining 6' between yourself and others
- Wear a mask anytime you are in our licensed areas
- Wash your hands for 20 seconds with soap and water or use hand sanitizer







# Lightning Slinger Turkey Creek Division July 27, 2021 Paint Brushes and Micro Torches

# The Brushes

As a lot of you probably know I do a lot of painting of parts and people all hand painted, not airbrush painted. I use a lot of brushes and am always on the lookout for good quality but low-cost brushes (what can I say, I'm frugal). I use both natural fiber and manmade fiber brushes but much prefer natural fiber when I can find them. I only use acrylic paints and clean my brushes and try to take good care of them. I use Windex as my cleaning solution. Manmade fiber bristles tend to bend and splay over time, usually a SHORT time. With most natural fiber brushes, I usually wear the bristles out and wear them down. I have some natural fiber brushes that I've used for years as they become smaller and smaller, but I don't have any manmade fiber brushes that have lasted nearly as long.





Pre pandemic lock down, I found two sets of brushes at Hobby Lobby that I really like. These sets are found in the department where they sell plastic model kits and Testors model paint. Both sets are \$5.99 and each set includes a variety of sizes. The orange handled brushes are called "spotters and pointers". I really like these for painting O scale figures and detail parts. From largest to smallest the sizes are a 1, 2, 0, 3/0, 5/0, 10/0. I believe this set is manmade fiber, but they really last and don't quickly develop that bend in the end of the bristle that I find common with most manmade fibers.

The second set, the black handled brushes are a little different. This set includes three quarter inch flat brushes and some of the finest pointed brushes available. In the past I've paid nearly as much for ONE fine tip brush as I paid for this entire set and these are every bit as good with a nice sharp point. The only brush in this set that I don't use frequently is the one with the angled ferrule. But if you're trying to paint inside a balcony on a scale building, these really come in handy. The bent ferrule brush is not sized. The three flats are all 0 size and the pointed brushes are a 5/0 and a 10/0. This set is definitely made with natural fibers.



The other thing that I really like about these brushes is the shape of the handles. I've developed a little arthritis in a knuckle of my right hand and trying to grip skinny paint brushes was aggravating it. With these larger handles that's no longer an issue.

As with any brushes you buy, check them before buying the set because occasionally a brush will be damaged when the plastic tubes used to protect the bristles is applied. So double check before you buy them.



# The Torch

Not often, but sometimes when building a model project, I've found that my soldering iron wasn't big enough to heat up the larger surface I was trying to solder. Once upon a time I had a small propane torch, but was always running out of propane just when I needed it. And yes, for all you engineers and chemical engineers out there, I know that if you crimp one end of a brass tube nearly shut and attach a piece of tubing to the other end, it creates a Venturi tube. Blowing through the hose with the crimped end at a candle flame you can actually create a small blow torch. (The restricted opening forces the air flow to speed up which causes additional oxygen through the candle flame creating a forced air blue flame fire.) I had to resort to that once for a museum project I built. But I don't have as much hot air as I used to (no comments from the Peanut Galley please!).



In a Dollar General store one day near the checkout, I discovered a disposable torch. The small one is about the size of two butane cigarette lighters and the fuel is under pressure. The smaller one was approximately \$6. This torch works really well. Beyond doing the "normal" soldering functions you use a torch for, I've found another use. I've been buying some 3D printed structures recently that come with removable interiors. Many of these come with "fuzz" or "hair" around some of the delicate parts, like the window frames or porch and balcony railings. Sanding or filing this fuzz just wasn't working and I had resorted to trying to burn it off using a cigarette lighter. While that worked the lighter's flame wasn't very controllable and I did melt a few window frames. This torch gives a small controllable flame and really removes the fuzz from the windows with just a little practice. Just don't try to do too much at once and keep the flame moving. It's just like taking the pin feathers off a chicken, if you've ever done that.

This torch works much like a cigarette lighter in that you push the button and get the flame, you release the button and the fuel is cut off and the flame stops immediately.

And for those of you who, like me have been buying Testors paint (especially Dull Cote) at Hobby Lobby, they appear to be dropping that paint line just like they dropped their weekly coupons. So look for the brushes in the aisle of the store where the Testors paint used to be displayed.







McKee and Diehl went to Denver to see **Mike Pyne of Wild West Models**, deliver a couple of models for Mike to review to see if he wants to add them to his kit offerings.

Good meeting, and we got a chance to see Mike's shop where he makes and assembles all of his models. Mike and Korie Pyne, Wild West Models, do not plan to attend Hickory NC Narrow Gauge, but he does plan to exhibit in Seattle NG and other NG conventions thereafter. The business is very busy. A great year 2020 and nearly as busy 2021, so far.



He has recently put out a new mine kit, "Druid Mine", available in HO at this time. Chickenman purchased one and plans to build in the near future, maybe for Modeling Challenge.





Mike acquired many of the molds from the old Western Scale Models. Unfortunately, many molds were badly worn! Mike refuses to produce poor castings. He is reworking molds, but it is very time consuming to accomplish. In due time, he plans to reissue the old Western Scale Models kits and Castings.

The shop is very busy. He is hurting for space. Currently, 10 lbs. of equipment squeezed in a 5 lb bag! But, as I have promoted to all of you, Wild West kits are quality engineered, they fit together very well and the instructions are easy to follow. **He obviously does a good job regardless of the limitations of his space.** 

Mike is a nice Man and We should Welcome young blood to our hoppy!

Steve and I met with his old friend, Greg Jackson, and we then visited three layouts. Very high quality layouts!






# A Hardrock Mine ... "Deer Creek Mine" in BitterRoot Canyon City

This model started as a Sierra West Craftsman Wood Kit. I wanted to make this a contest model. I had to create a different layout which would not make the model feel pressed or squeezed to fit a 1' x 1' base.

I studied several layout positions as to how the head frame, or bin and power house would look plausible. I decided to use a 90 degree angle orientation of the power house to the ore bin, positioning the head frame at a "pivot" position, then allows the "spoils" pile to be logically positioned as a roll-off out of the skip, to drop the waste excavation rock/soils.

I built a new head frame, taller and with a secondary frame grouping to provide support for the height and extra work space at the skip to route the tailings.

A **tailings dump** was provided with two support trestle bents, tied together to strengthen the tall height for waste pile support.

A water pump shed was built close to the shaft, discharging into a water tank. Water is filtered and used in the boiler to steam the cable hoist and air pump for the mine.

A **kitchen dining office** was built to support the miners' long days and longer distance to the nearby community of BitterRoot Canyon City.

A **storage shed** for dynamite is provided away from the mine in case of accidental explosions.

Construction is basically wood, paper, cardboard, plaster, metal and resin castings.



The **head frame** is wood framing cut and fit to the drawing templates provided in the kit. Most of the joints are white glued, then pinned with .019" brass wire. All diagonals are fitted to the field conditions/dimensions.

The small roof roll roofing, made from black paper, weathered edges, applied with 5 min epoxy.

The **shaft** is timber lined about 1" deep.

The **ore tipple** is constructed of timber frames fitted to templates furnished with the kit. The frames assembled with timber connections and members cut and fitted. Most joints, where possible, were pinned with brass wire, to strengthen the full assembly.

The **roof** is Campbell corrugated metal, first weathered with rusted edges, made by digging an Exacto knife, then painted rust with mineral spirits/Bragdon pigments. All applied with stiff brush, before assembly of panels. Then applied over 2 x 6 purlins and joists with 5 min epoxy. The **Power House** was built using kit wall frames, cut 3' narrower. Doors and windows were "reversed" and "flipped" to suit my module layout.

New roof trusses were made. New cardboard roof sheathing cut and fitted. A clerestory was created using Tichy windows, cut and "mulled" together.

The "wood shingles" are paper colored with paint and three shades of pastel chalk, then shingles twisted before assembly, to create shadow lines.

Air duct tube is Evergreen tubing with "joint collars" added.

Roll roofing is black paper colored with pastel chalks. Edges weathered, applied with 5 min epoxy.

Roof is intended to be removed to see equipment inside the Power House.






The **boiler** was made from two old SS Ltd castings, wood spacers, wood base wrapped in paper embossed to show bolts and "cross panel" broke as panel reinforcing. Stack made from Evergreen tubing, heated and expanded to the taper to sit on top of the boiler. Joint collars made/added.

The water pump building

made by sheathing a small cardboard medicine box with 2 x 8's and 2 x 10's. All lumber first weathered with razor saw and stained. Edges highlighted with a dark color alcohol marker before assembly. Door and louvers scratchmade. Roof is shingles like Power House. Piping is PVC tubing heated and bent with joints created.

**Dynamite Store Building** is also built from a "medicine box base", similar to water pump building.

The **kitchen/dining/office** is also a small medicine box base, with strip wood weathered/covered the box base. Roof is roll roofing colored pastels on black paper.



The **water tank** is made with 2 x 6 weathered strip wood glued to a small cardboard tube. Bands are .032" solder. The solder applied with epoxy. Water is pigment dyed gloss Mod Podge. Piping is styrene rod tube bent and shaped.
